


## Today's Purpose

- 1. Provide information about Cascade's annual milfoil treatment program.
- 2. Present pilot project idea that enables HOAs to pay Cascade's applicator (Aquatechnex) for more milfoil treatment in Lake Tapps Reservoir.










#### Background

- Milfoil has been a persistent challenge that precedes
   Cascade's ownership and operation of Lake Tapps Reservoir.
- Per Ecology, only Cascade is permitted to chemically treat milfoil in the Reservoir.
- State and Pierce County initially classified milfoil as Class B noxious weed – control required.
- Milfoil is no longer regulated Pierce County encourages voluntary control measures.
- Cascade chemically treats the most heavily concentrated areas of milfoil to meet its operational needs. Treatment areas based on:
  - Boat surveys (prior and current years)
  - Prior and current year homeowner reports
- Treatment lasts for 1-3 years.
- Historically, treatment occurred in mid-July and August;
   Ecology clarified that treatment can start earlier.



### **Annual Milfoil Treatment Program**








# 2020-2022 Treated Areas

#### **Background Continued**

- Summer 2022 community meeting some homeowners offered to pay for more treatment.
- Cascade researched and determined that Lake Management District (LMD) is not viable in short term:
  - Extensive and complex process for formation
  - Cascade not authorized to create an LMD likely to be created and governed by Pierce County
  - Pierce County would ultimately control assessment and use of funds
- In response to the community, Cascade is exploring a pilot project that enables HOAs to pay Aquatechnex for more milfoil treatment, subject to Resource Management Committee and Board approval.







#### Pilot Project Concept

- In addition to Cascade's annual treatment program:
  - HOAs that participate in the pilot would request service from and pay Aquatechnex for milfoil treatment (no native plants).
  - Aquatechnex would handle all administrative duties (e.g. routes, billing, record keeping) and work directly with HOAs.
- Cascade's Board's interests:
  - Minimize costs to and involvement by Cascade.
  - Reduce risk of homeowners doing own chemical treatment.
  - Address equity issues (access to treatment).
  - Reinforce message that this is a pilot and is not a commitment to an on-going program.







#### Pilot Project Concept Continued

#### Issues to be addressed:

- Which HOAs will participate? (must have active corporate status) Not all 7 HOAs need to participate.
- How will HOAs determine which homeowners will participate and which areas to treat?
- HOAs to verify that all parcels in the participating areas have dock numbers.
- How will HOAs collect payments from homeowners and make payment to Aquatechnex?
- Timeline for signing up for treatment and for treatment.
- Equity (access) issues.
- Agreement between Cascade and participating HOAs (similar to Cascade's licensing program) – indemnification to Cascade.







#### Pilot Project Concept Continued

- Estimated treatment costs:
  - About \$4 per foot of shoreline
  - Lower costs if treatment is by the acre
- Treatment is more effective if treated parcels are contiguous.
- Milfoil growth tends to be less problematic in areas deeper than 15 feet.
- Aquatechnex can assist HOAs and homeowners determine how much area to treat.

#### **Next Steps**

- Identify which HOAs are interested in participating as soon as possible.
- Meet with interested HOAs to discuss logistics (based on issues on prior slides).
- Develop a detailed implementation plan by March 31 with participating HOAs.
- Present proposed implementation plan to Cascade's Resource Management Committee and Board and get approval to do the pilot in late April.
- Note: Regardless of the outcome of the pilot, Cascade will continue with its annual treatment program.
